Superfast broadband is coming to Ardgay and District in 2016

A cabinet will provide high speed broadband to all houses 2 Km from the centre of Ardgay. The Kyle of Sutherland Development Trust is exploring how a community owned broadband company could be formed for those who live further away.

SUPERFAST BROADBAND is coming to Ardgay sometime early next year from a green cabinet in the centre of the village. Residents will be able to order it from their service provider once the cabinet "goes live". Those who live closest to the cabinet will get the highest speeds and as you go further out the speeds will drop off. If you are more than about 2 km

away from the village centre it is likely that you will not get any improvement in your current speeds. Because of this, the Kyle of Sutherland Development Trust is exploring setting up a community run and owned broadband company which would bring fast broadband to those who may not be reached from the cabinet. 

The bright yellow cycle wheeling ramp, pictured, was percieved as an urgent need at roughly the same time by both Creich Community Council and Ardgay & District Community Council. That was about three years ago and since then Sandy Chalmers kept the concept alive and moving forward. He obtained a design from a local steel fabricator and consulted Highland Council officials to work up an acceptable project. Eventually, in addition to the two community councils and the fabricator, Highland Council, Network Rail and Sustrans all became involved to finalise the design and get the steel installed. ARDGAY VILLAGE CENTRE WILL GET SUPERFAST BROADBAND EARLY IN 2016, THE REST WILL NEED TO WAIT

A superfast community owned broadband company for the Kyle of Sutherland?

The Kyle of Sutherland Development Trust is working with Community Broadband Scotland, who specialise in getting hard to reach areas connected, to investigate whether there is a demand for this and what the technical options are.

All households in the outlying areas have recently received a letter and survey about broadband. If there is enough demand for a community broadband service then Community Broadband Scotland will help the Trust set up the infrastructure and management needed. The cost of community broadband to households would be pegged to follow market prices so it would not cost more than you would pay with a mainstream provider.

MEETING IN BONAR BRIDGE

On 23rd November, a well-attended meeting arranged by Kyle of Sutherland Development Trust took place at Bonar Bridge Hall. Nick Scroggie, Project Manager of the Digital Team at HIE, explained about the roll-out of Superfast broadband in Highland. It is expected that the green cabinet in Ardgay will go live early in 2016. Although they have extended the superfast "backbone" and are installing new green cabinets, the service will still rely on the existing copper wire from these cabinets to reach households. It is

hoped that this will reach 84% of households.

Sarah Jones, Advisor with Community Broadband Scotland, explained that the Scottish Government has set up this organisation to find ways of getting fast broadband to the remaining 16% of households because as you get further away from a green cabinet the speed you will receive will drop off. This can be an issue in rural areas like ours where houses are spread out.

SUCCESSFUL SCHEMES

Sarah Jones gave examples of schemes which she has been involved in such as Locheilnet in Lochaber, which has 200 subscribers paying about £15 per month and Gigaplus Argyll which connects the islands of Islay, Jura, Coll, Craignish, Lismore and Mull; about 3,000 people in 1,500 premises.

At this stage they are studying maps of our area to calculate how many households are more than 2km away from the cabinet and which postcodes they belong to. Community Broadband Scotland will come back in early 2016 with further information and there will be a public meeting to finalise the shape of the project in our area.

Ron Boothroyd from the KoSDT encouraged everyone to return the survey which was delivered to all outlying households.

"Survey results are coming in and it is clear that there are many areas in the Kyle of Sutherland where the broadband speed is currently very poor." Calum Couston, Community Development Assistant, KoSDT.

THE BANK IS ALSO CUTTING HOURS AT DORNOCH AND HELMSDALE

Opposition to the reduction in hours at the Bank of Scotland branch

Ardgay and District Community Council recently sent a letter to the Bank of Scotland expressing people's concerns and explaining how this measure will have a negative impact on the community. No answer has been received yet.

BANK OF SCOTLAND has failed to acknowledge receipt of the letter sent by Ardgay & District Community Council regarding the reduction in hours at the local branch of the Bank of Scotland. This letter supports the campaign led by Michael Baird in Bonar Bridge.

Here are some of the points raised by Ardgay & District CC:

- "There was no consultation with your customers or the community of interest. The reduction in footfall [...] is most likely a result of the bank in Bonar Bridge's already reduced opening hours only 2 days per week. The Bank has created the conditions which have led to this situation and further reduction in hours will, we fear, lead to closure."
- "An aging population, a non-existent public transport system and irregular opening hours at the closest branches (20 30 mile round trip) make the alternatives to using the local bank branch not just inconvenient but unworkable."

• "The Treasurers of many local groups, including this Community Council, who are willing volunteers, will now face obstacles to doing business. As the bank does not offer an account for small local community organisations, most of these groups operate the business account and find communication with the central office very difficult and unsatisfactory. When issues arise, [...] in the end it is only the local staff,

who understand the situation on the ground, who can help them navigate the bureaucratic maze that the business account has become."

- "There is a real danger that members of the community will shy away from becoming treasurer for these groups and the groups' existence will be threatened."
- The bank should feel some loyalty and make some "social payback" to a populace which locally has supported the bank for decades."
- "Reducing the hours at Bonar Bridge will result in the human face of the bank, the one which helps people do business, becoming largely unavailable."
- "Telephone and internet bank scamming is on the increase. This is not a time to be reducing face to face contact."
- "Bank of Scotland should recognise its debt to this remote rural community of loyal customers and reconsider this decision."

LOCAL CAMPAIGNER

Michael Baird, has been campaigning against the bank's unpopular decision for months. His plea last appeared at the Press & Journal on the 29th November, where he stated: "It is definitely a lifeline service because for many people, it is the last thing they have got available, especially older people who go there to collect their pensions and pay their bills."

Muirhall Energy - Caplich to fund training co-ordinated by Lairg Learning Centre

THE DEVELOPERS OF Caplich Wind Farm have pledged £8,000 to the three Community Council areas of Ardgay & District, Creich and Lairg, to spend on training. Lairg & District Learning Centre will co-ordinate the scheme. The classes will be run in all three areas in the first half of 2016.

WHO CAN BENEFIT?

Suggestions are already coming in and a popular choice seems to be learning how to use a chainsaw. This ticketed training helps residents improve their employability skills, but the community also benefits as more locals will have the skills to help with, say, coppicing the community woods. please contact the centre if this is your choice of course.

Another idea is to help crofters with digital inclusion because large organisations are making more day-to-day croft administration computerised. Or how about drystone walling? A short course could provide sufficient information and practical experience to be able to rebuild a small section of wall.

SOME APPLICANTS FAIL TO GET FUNDING BECAUSE THEY MAKE EASY-TO-AVOID MISTAKES

Ten golden rules when applying for Community Wind Farm Awards

We asked members of local Wind Farm Award panels what are the most common errors that applicants make, and how to increase the chances of getting a grant.

WETHER YOU ARE ALREADY familiar with funding applications or you are thinking of applying for the first time, here are some tips that can help you maximise the chances of being successful.

1 DO SOME RESEARCH. Read as much as possible about the fund or funds you are going to apply to. Visit their websites and look for the guidelines that most of them have available to download.

2 funders if you have any questions. Your Community Council or the Kyle of Sutherland Development Trust will also be happy to assist you.

SELECT THE RIGHT FUND FOR YOUR PROJECT. Some awards are designed to fund big projects, and the application process is usually lengthy; others are targeted to small projects, have a limit e.g. £2,000, and you will have the final decision in just one or two months. It seems obvious, but do not try to apply for more money than the fund is able to give.

MAKE SURE YOU ARE ENTI-TLED TO A GRANT. Community Wind Farm Benefit panels will only make awards to non-profit organisations or constituted charities. If you are trying to apply as an individual or a business, you will need to try other sources of funding. YOU ARE AND WHAT YOU DO.
While writing your application, you need to describe your group, saying how many members it has, how many times a week/month/year you

EXPLAIN IN DETAIL WHO

meet, etc. Do not take it for granted that the people who are going to make a decision already know you.

TELL THEM HOW OBTAINING THE AWARD IS GOING TO MAKE A DIFFERENCE for the community, and who is going to benefit from it. This is perhaps the most important of all points. Ask yourself: "How many people from the relevant area will benefit directly from the award? And how many indirectly?" For example, your project is based in Ardgay, but the members of your group are residents of Bonar Bridge and Lairg. In this case, you could file three different applications to community funds in Ardgay, Creich and Lairg.

Community Wind Farm Awards will not give funds to:

- Support the advancement of commerce, religion or politics
- Hospitality as a reward for normal business activity
- Costs already incurred
- Repayment of loans
- Purchase of a vehicle
- Buy second hand items
- Activities contrary to the interests of renewable energy

THE COSTS. The members of the panel need to know how your group is going to spend the money.

If you write a breakdown of your expenses, you give them the opportunity of funding some of the costs, if not all. If you do not give details you will very likely receive a negative answer.

SETULLY, even if it is not the first time. Just because your organisation got money from the same fund before does not mean that they are going to grant it again. The panel might have changed, or they can decide that your project is not relevant anymore. Show them you take things seriously, do not write a careless application and be surprised if it is refused.

TRY TO GET OTHER SOURC-ES OF INCOME for your project and reflect that in your application. The panel will be more inclined to grant you money if they see you are raising funds elsewhere. Some funds will only exceptionally give money to cover 100% of the costs of a project.

ACKNOWLEDGE THE GRANT. Once you have your funding, do not forget to thank the funders. Also, ensure that you acknowledge their help in any publicity that you use in connection with the project. Silvia Muras

Party Safely messages include planning ahead for nights out, sticking with friends and being sensible about how much alcohol is consumed.


Home Safety advice includes tips on keeping homes secure and ensuring presents are kept out of sight.

KYLE OF SUTHERLAND DEVELOPMENT TRUST SECURES OVER £300,000 FOR "COSY HOMES" PROJECT

British Gas Energy Trust Healthy Homes Fund

In January 2016 KoSDT is launching "Cosy Homes East Sutherland Scheme" to provide energy efficiency measures for homes which will bring about an improvement in the health of the householders.

Kyle of Sutherland Development Trust has been awarded £326,983 for Cosy Homes East Sutherland Scheme (CHESS). An innovative project to provide energy efficiency measures for homes which through the installation of new heating systems, double glazing or other energy efficiency measures will bring about an improvement in the health of the householders. The project will be led by Rhionna Mackay who was previously the Project Officer for Greening Kyle, a carbon reduction project in the Kyle of Sutherland. Rhionna will be joined by local Sarah Forrest who has been appointed as the part time Project Assistant.

Local support for CHESS was provided by the medical practices in Brora, Golspie and Bonar Bridge and Home Energy Scotland. KOSDT will commence this new project in January 2016 when referrals will be made by the medical practices and through self-referrals. Households who meet the criteria will be eligible for measures costing up to a maximum of £12,000. There will also be a hardship fund available to households which find themselves in fuel poverty.

This major project to provide affordable warmth in homes throughout East Sutherland has been funded by the British Gas Energy Trust Healthy Homes Scheme. Administered by Charis Grants on behalf of the Trust, the Healthy Homes Scheme is funding projects aiming to assist low income, vulnerable households address health problems exacerbated by fuel poverty.

Kyle of Sutherland Development Trust is one of just over 40

projects to achieve funding from the British Gas Energy Trust after it received more than 140 applications from organisations across the UK. Cosy Homes East Sutherland Scheme is one of just six projects in Scotland to be successful.

Alec Broadhurst, Healthy Homes Programme Manager at Charis Grants said "Charis Grants are delighted to award Kyle of Sutherland Development Trust funding on behalf of the British Gas Energy Trust Healthy Homes Scheme. We look forward to supporting them as they work with local partners to provide affordable warmth and deliver a positive impact on the health and well-being of vulnerable people in East Sutherland"■

A year with many community activities and projects coming to fruition

Kyle of Sutherland Development Trust held its AGM on the 16th November. Peter Campbell, Chairman, and Helen Houston, Development Manager, presented their anual reports.

It has been a very busy year for the KoSDT. The Trust has supported many groups to access funds for their projects or to provide advice on matters such as governance and finance. £62,509 has been successful raised on behalf of local groups.

GREENING KYLE

The team have held 30 events to provide people with information on home energy, growing your own food and cookery classes. 60 home energy visits have been carried out and the team have also been referring clients to the Trust's 'A Helping Hand' small grants scheme providing fuel poor households with much needed fuel.

POST OFFICE

Catriona Hill brought the renovation of the post office house to completion on time and in budget. On December 2014 planning permission was granted for a terrace of three, one bedroom units on the land behind the post office. The Trust continues to watch for fund-

ing opportunities to be able to continue this development.

SCOTGRAD ASSOCIATE

The Trust sought a Community Development Assistant Scot Grad Associate and appointed Calum Couston, who moved from the central belt to take up his position.

KEEP ACTIVE TOGETHER

One full time and one part time position were offered and the project officer Beverley Hill moved from the central belt to take up the position and locally based Emma Mackay was successful in her application as activity assistant. The aim of the project is to provide activities which promote health and wellbeing for older people and families.

SMALL GRANT SCHEME

The scheme has been funded by EON Rosehall Community Windfarm fund. The small grants are reaching people who may not benefit in any other way from windfarm funds.

TRUST OFFICE

On average 30 people a week access the services offered by the Trust, this being for photocopying, to arrange an energy visit, enquire about events or to seek assistance for their community group.

Membership has grown from 67 to 225.■




