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Schools of past times

At the end of the 19th century, there were four newly built public schools in Kincardine Parish: Achnahannet, Croick, Culrain and Gledfield.

THEY PROVIDED accommodation for 40, 35, 50, and 110 children respectively and they had in 1881 an average attendance of 25, 17, 27, and 67. Today, only Gledfield is still open with 27 pupils on the roll last year. (*Page 18*)



Another aspect of the partnership with the Trust is that it will enable *Kyle Chronicle* to offer very attractive advertising rates to local businesses and -crucially- concession prices for charities and community groups operating locally. So, no matter the size of your group, you will be able to share your event, course or activity with the wider community for a very small price.

Kyle Chronicle will also be an intergenerational project. I'm

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

Message from the Chairperson

S you can read elsewhere, this will be the last edition of this Ardgay & District Community Council newsletter. Since its beginning some 10 years ago, it has developed by way of lots of hard work from its editors, contributors and distributors into what you see today. On behalf of Ardgay Community Council I would like to thank all those individuals – but particularly David Hannah, whose idea this was and our first Editor, and Silvia Muras the current Editor.

Silvia is moving on to producing a local magazine in partnership with the Kyle of Sutherland Development Trust, with similar inputs from local groups but with a wider coverage. We wish Silvia all the best with her new venture and look forward to the first edition!

This last edition also coincides with

your current community councillors coming to the end of their term in office. The funding from the Highland Council to run the Community Council has been slashed from £977 to £399 during the four years since I have been Chairperson. This has meant that we have had to decrease the number of meetings from the preferred 10 each year to the present six - and even this reduced number are only affordable through extra funding from the Ward discretionary budget, funding which should be used for other community projects. Not only does this make it difficult for us to respond to consultation deadlines in a timely fashion, it reduces the number of outside speakers we can invite to discuss local issues affecting you, and increases the length of time applicants have to wait for accessing funding from Beinn Tharsuinn and Beinn nan Oighrean Community Benefit funds as these are considered by the CC. It really is time our local Highland councillors gave us more support and reversed this ridiculous budget cut. I personally cannot understand why the Scottish government is pursuing its community Empowerment agenda and funding a possible Citizens Assembly whilst local councils are not being funded to adequately support the already existing most local form of government – your Community Council.

Despite these concerns, I believe the best way to address the situation with the Highland Council is to form a strong and committed community council. I would therefore urge members of the community to seriously consider putting themselves forward for the forthcoming elections. You can find details of the nomination and election dates on page 8.

Lighting Ardgay at Christmas – Team needed!

THE LAST FEW years the Community Council have put up a Christmas tree on Ardgay Green. This has been put up and decorated by volunteers. For 2018 a team of a dozen people assembled, the tree was raised and toasted with mulled wine; a happy community event. But the last two years, although we have put up the tree, we have not put up the lamppost lights.

This was for several reasons: partly any Christmas efforts were displaced to the very excellent Santa-inthe woods which The Hub and other local groups organised, but also that it was felt that having a volunteer teetering at the top of a ladder to fix these things in place was not really safe. Also the Highland Council have complicated the fixing of these by charging -what seems a lot of money- to fix electrical connections if any are faulty.

But the biggest deterrent to putting up the lamp-post lights has been the lack of people to help with putting these heavy and awkward lights in place. For this year we have the generous offer of a cherry-picker (a railed platform that can be raised or lowered to height). We are very grateful for this as it will make putting these lights up safe and (possibly!) comparatively straight forward.

And so in mid-November we will have a brief meeting in Ardgay Hall (date to be confirmed and circulated) when we will be able to see if we have a team of half a dozen who are wanting to assist with putting these lights up. And if there are a few people who might wish to extend this to other Christmas themed projects this

could be discussed, too. example Santa-inthe-woods was lovely, but required a lot of preparation; Santa might be willing to visit again if elves can be provided. And another suggestion going the rounds is that we encourage and support individual houses in decorating in seasonal theme to give the whole village a sense of celebration... 
The Big Tea Party

The importance of the Trust's social projects

KoSDT has recently been the recipient of the 'Reducing Vulnerability in the Community' Award

IN NOVEMBER OF last year Kyle of Sutherland Development Trust applied to the Scottish Council for Voluntary Organisations (SCVO) and the University of Edinburgh to be part of their Food, Poverty and Social Exclusion research Project. Through this KoSDT were able to host a post-graduate intern. Lee McNeish, who undertook an eight-week independent research project to look at the impact of our work at the Community Food Stop and its associated strands. Lee spent most of June living in Bonar Bridge, during this time he interviewed many local people to get a better understanding of the impact of the Food Stop on the community.

We were very pleased to receive Lee's independent report. It is an excellent piece of work that helps to reinforce the great work undertaken by Beverley Hill and her team. It made me very proud of KoSDT, the staff, and the volunteers. Long may we continue to promote and develop projects that have such a positive influence on our community. Planet Sutherland: encouraging changes to help save the planet

ARE YOU WORRIED about the planet? Has fear paralysed you? Are you confused and frustrated trying to sort out real and fake news? Too depressed to do anything? Don't know where to start? With Arctic fires and plastic rain, what's the point? It's just too late!!

Well, that was me a wee while back. Then one morning I woke up (or well... I got up,

having been awake most of the night...) and decided to do something which culminated in forming Planet Sutherland.

The group is about encouraging change and supporting each other's aims and ideas. Changes may be simply about improving recycling, about turning off the tap, or larger project such as tree planting, lobbying business and governments or ... well, who knows where we may end up. One other significant outcome of the group though, is that we are all already definitely feeling less depressed and much more happy about being able to do something to help.

It was coincidence that started the group off in Ardgay, where a small group of us have met a few times. We've organised a very interesting recycling talk from the Highland Council (thanks to the Ardgay & District CC) and are working on a garden apple tree planting project

- Orchard Ardgay! To begin with, we're hoping to provide about 20 trees for folks to plant in their own gardens.

Hopefully this apple tree project will spread to other areas. It's a great way to plant trees and eat local produce. Please do get in touch if you're interested.

At the time of writing, meetings have been held in Ardgay and Bonar Bridge and Lairg. It

was great to meet folks from Dornoch and Brora and Rosehall at the Lairg meeting. We also attended the Kyle of Stherland Development Trust Big Tea Party and I popped over to Dornoch market to chat with folks there.

Given the size of Sutherland, we can't just have one central group - it would be ludicrous for us all to all travel to a central point to chat on a regular basis. Thus, what I'm hop-

ing is that we can form small groups in all the villages who can meet regularly, but that we can then all support each other and share ideas.

Various ideas coming along just now are: helping the school garden projects; helping the Dornoch Academy Plastic Straw Free Project; car and tool sharing; getting better at reducing and recycling; sharing excess produce; getting more produce at the local markets; and many more.

Sharing information is key to the success of this group. I know that there are many initiatives already on the go – please do join us and share what you're doing. There's lots of information on our website, where you can also join the mailing list, and if you're on



IT WILL PROVIDE ENERGY AND FUEL POVERTY ADVICE TO SUTHERLAND & CAITHNESS RESIDENTS.

New Energy Advice Project at CAB

EAST & CENTRAL Sutherland CAB have been successful in their bid to Scottish & Southern Electricity Networks and have now appointed an adviser to provide specialised energy and fuel poverty advice to Sutherland & Caithness residents. This project will run for 1 year, up until May 2020.

Fuel poverty is a major issue in Sutherland & Caithness due to high energy costs, the lack of mains gas and many households having to rely on electric heating. High fuel costs can mean that many clients have to choose between heating their home or buying food (often referred to as 'heat or eat').

The CAB energy adviser will assist clients by checking energy bills and tariffs, liaising with energy

providers, identifying additional sources of help with energy costs, advising on how to use heating more efficiently and helping clients access energy efficiency grants e.g. via Home Energy Scotland. For many people, understanding their energy bill and also looking into the best tariffs for their needs is a difficult and time consuming topic and the CAB energy adviser is here to help with these and any other energy issues.

Schools of past times

Around sixty years ago, there were four primary schools in the district commonly known until 1975 as Kincardine Parish: Gledfield, Culrain, Croick, and Achnahannet.

Miss Bruce legacy at the Highland Museum of Childhood

The Highland Museum of Childhood is located in the old railway station in Strathpeffer. When Miss Mary Bruce (former teacher at Achnahannet and Croick Primary schools) passed away, the Museum was given most of her teaching items including books and teaching aids, memos, letters and photos. It is a great collection showing Mary's life in teaching, which was put together in an exhibition back in 2013.

The schools were built in the 19th century (Gledfield school opened in 1875), probably part of the extensive programme of school building undertaken after the Education Act 1872 which made primary education universal and mandatory in Scotland.

The four "new" public schools were **Gledfield**: with accommodation for 110 pupils and annual grant of £53, 6s. 6d. in 1881; **Culrain**: 50 pupils and a grant of £31, 0s. 6d.; **Achnahannet**: 40 pupils and a grant of £36, 11s. 6d.; and **Croick**: 35 pupils and a grant of £66, 3s. 6d, as reported in *Ordnance Gazetteer of Scotland* (1882-84).

Nowadays only Gledfield is used as a school, with 27 pupils on the roll last year, while most other buildings have been converted into houses.

The importance of local primary schools in rural areas has been thoroughly researched, as this is such a contentious policy issue, addressed >>>

most recently in the Schools Consultation (Scotland) Act 2010. The financial pressure on local councils given the high per capita costs of running small schools is the main reason for their closure, while the contributions that they make in maintaining rural community vibrancy is one of the arguments for retaining them.

What can hardly be disputed is the importance of schools anywhere, but particularly in rural areas, in the creation and nurturing of collective memories, which in turn reinforce people's sense of identity and their belonging to a place. A shared history, transmitted between generations and imparted from local to incomer, is a fundamental part of establishing and strengthening social relations.



Ed: "I have met more people from the community since I have been using the Hub. I haven't done any exercise for 20 years, and in my 70th year I have lost four stones and got myself reasonably fit. This gave me the incentive to run a marathon. I am an insulin dependent diabetic. When I joined the Hub Gym, my blood/sugar level was 71.

The exercise regime has reduced my insulin dependency down to an almost negligible level, and my blood/sugar level to 51. The doctors and diabetic nurses in my medical practice cannot believe the improvement in my blood/sugar levels and consequently my overall health. I have not felt this fit and healthy for many, many years."



The Reds Return!

Red squirrels to be released in the Ledmore & Migdale woodlands throughout October and November.

The RED squirrel is one of our most characteristic native mammals – an iconic inhabitant of the woodlands that it helps to propagate as it goes about its business of collecting nuts and seeds. Sadly, despite once being present across most of the UK, its numbers have been decimated by habitat loss and the introduction of the non-native grey squirrel. Scotland is the reds' last remaining stronghold, but the species is still missing from much of its former range.

Since 2016 Trees for Life has been creating new populations of red squirrels throughout the northwest Highlands – carefully capturing reds from areas where there are healthy populations and moving them to suitable forests in the northwest where they can thrive, free from the threat of greys and the devastating disease that they carry, Squirrel pox. The charity has created seven new populations so far and all are flourishing and expanding throughout the available habitat.

TRANSLOCATION PROGRAMME

We are now beginning the second phase of our red squirrel translocations and are turning our sights northwards. Red squirrels are already present not far away – there has been a fantastic spread from Roy Dennis' 2011/12 releases at Alladale, Amat and Croick. We now want to bolster the genetic diversity of this population to ensure its health long-term, and to begin colonisation to the east, beginning with Spinning-dale and continuing with another release at Loch Fleet in 2020.

These woodlands provide perfect

red squirrel habitat and so, in partnership with The Woodland Trust, 20 squirrels will be released at Ledmore and Migdale throughout October and November. After a health check they will be placed in specially-built nest boxes, lined with hay for warmth and provisioned with apple and peanuts. Once at the release site, the boxes will be secured to trees and the exit holes stuffed with moss, to allow the squirrels to leave when ready. Supplementary food will be provided for several months, to give the squirrels an easy food supply whilst they settle into their new surroundings.

There will be lots of opportuni-

ties for local people to take part in the project – by keeping the feeders topped up with nuts (always a good chance to see a squirrel!), by joining one of our guided walks and monitoring days, or by reporting sightings and feeding sign – this is extremely useful as it helps us to monitor how the squirrels are getting on. We're very excited about Ledmore and Migdale becoming a key step in helping to secure the future of our red squirrels. The next time you take a walk to the loch, keep a lookout for a bushy tail and a pair of tufty red ears!

Leila Wood

Be Still My Soul When Dearest Friends Depart

ly for me this year and I can feel the gloom descending. One day at a time is the message I have adopted. Before the gloom I was bathing in a perpetual ray of sunshine since meeting Leila on a dusty road in Central Finland on August 5th, 1969 at around 5:10pm. Her cancer finally took her away on July 15th, 2019. She was a great survivor carrying this illness since 1998.

Leila always wanted to be a doctor but her parents couldn't afford the costs of sending her to Medical School. More's the pity as she had a huge compassion for people and gave generously to Mercy Ships and Marie Curie. A dedicated nurse trained in Kuopio, Finland, in the mid 60s she moved to Stockholm and worked as a nurse anaesthetist. After moving to England she did a further 7 months training at St Bartholomew's Hospital in London and became a State Registered on September 6th, 1971 and went straight to work as a Sister on general wards.

We moved to Southampton in 1972 and Leila continued in theatre nursing. Eyes, neurology and gynaecology. We moved to Helsinki in 1974 and in 1976 were suddenly offered an adopted child as two ectopic pregnancies prevented us having our own children. We both had to leave our work and move back to England to go through the adoption process. Leila had to remain for 6 months and I went back to Finland after six weeks. Leila worked part time as a nurse as well as bringing up Alex. He

was a handful at the best of times but her character was always to be calm and considerate. He is severely dyslexic but has managed to overcome the worst issues of his condition. He's now 43 and has had two children with his partner Niki. We returned to England permanently in 1980. I continued to work in the music business and Leila went to work in the operating theatres at Luton & Dunstable Hospital followed by a stint at Vauxhall Motors Occupational Health Department and finally ran a similar department at Luton Airport. However the stress took its toll and we decided to move to Scotland and it was without doubt the best decision we ever made. Peace and quiet at last in a deeply rural community. Still Leila managed to rush headlong into running the local Post Office in Altass out of the church vestry in which we lived.

So what was she really like? An avid gardener turning a barren chunk of land into an oasis of flowers, fruit and vegetables. She loved animals and apart from supporting several charities we've had two springer spaniels from Munlochy and two cats from Bonar Bridge. *The Supervet* was a constant watch on tele-

vision, even the regular repeats. She liked to read Penelope Lively, Helen Dunmore, Colin Thubron and listened to Delius, Bax, Moeran, Sibelius and Ravel. Favourite films included *Dr. Zhivago, Dead Poets Society, Life of Pi, La Vie en Rose* and *Pan's Labyrynth*.

Leila liked to travel and we managed to visit Italy, France, Spain, Greece and our last holiday was to Iceland. We knew this was to be our last trip together as Leila was on the slow fatal downward trajectory. To watch such a gentle person diminish was a cruel fate indeed. It's hard to explain why Leila rarely complained about her illness. She just took it on the chin and lived for the day!

As long as the earth is round and boundless we will remember you / As long as grasses grow we will remember you / As long as there's cool deep water we will remember you / As long as birds ascend and descend we will always remember you.





Rejoice with those who rejoice, weep with those who weep

ack in $M_{\mbox{\scriptsize AY}}$ it was the 100th anniversary of the birth of Pete Seeger. For those unfamiliar with the work of this American folk singer/songwriter and social activist, one of his best known songs, written in the sixties, 'Turn! Turn! Turn!' was made popular by many singers and groups including: The Byrds, Judy Collins and The Seekers. What's fascinating for me about this song is that, apart from the beginning of each verse and a single line at the end, it's more or less a verbatim quote from Ecclesiastes 3:1-8. 'There is a time for ... everything under Heaven'.

That passage from Ecclesiastes is quite often read at funerals. One of the reasons for its popularity is that this passage deals with the concerns and matters of everyday life: birth, death, planting, harvesting, healing, weeping, laughing, mourning, dancing, keeping, throwing away, loving, hating, war and peace. It doesn't shy away from the less desirable ones, finding a place for each. In my role in ministry, I have

writer of 'Turn! Turn! the privilege to be invited to spend time with people who are going through all manner of difficult and sad times as well as joyful and pleasant ones. People who are doing most of the things that the writer of Ecclesiastes mentions (though perhaps not so many who're actively waging war).

There are times in all our lives when, to put it mildly, things aren't going well. Sickness and accident serve to remind us just how fragile is our health and that of those that we love. Uninvited change can serve to remind us just how fragile our home and family life and all that we've taken for granted in the world around us are. Many of us aren't in our first flush of youth and we can't manage all that we used to be able to do, and

many things aren't as we remember them when we were younger.

There are many things going on around us that seem very much out of kilter with how they should be in a fair and just world. It's sometimes tempting to believe that things are getting steadily worse and in spite of all our prayers, God either isn't listening or has given up on us completely. But of course there's nothing new in any of this. The book of Psalms provides us with ample evidence that people have felt like this for at least the last 3500 years. Dipping into the Psalms we hear anger, frustration and pleading (as well as the whole gamut of positivity, joy, praise and thanksgiving).

In these days of uncertainty, when many people have anxieties about the future, we have to find something or someone to trust. We can trust in ourselves and our own ability to overcome whatever life throws at us. We can trust in 'someone else' to sort things out on our behalf. Or we can trust in a power beyond ourselves, a power that I would refer to as God, but which others may perceive in a variety of different ways. If it's a power that brings out the best in people, that stirs people to come to the assistance of others who're in need, that's so often in evidence in times of disaster and which provides comfort to those who're suffering or in pain then I don't mind what it is called, I just thank God for it. 




