P1-3 are doing Kodaly music again this term which is like Feis (Youth Music Initiative) except it is for younger children. **ARDGAY & DISTRICT COMMUNITY COUNCIL** - Minutes of meeting-Wednesday 03/11/2010-Ardgay Hall **Present**: - David Hannah (Chair), Doreen Gibbs (Secretary), Alan Lawrence (Treasurer), Derek Matheson, Phil Olson, Marion Turner, David Laver, David Ross, William MacLaren, Peter Armstrong, Cllr. Robbie Rowantree.

- **1. Welcome** The chair opened the meeting by welcoming those present.
- 2. Apologies received from Liz Cormack.
- 3. Minutes of the meeting held on 13 October 2010 approved as presented with amendments.
- **4. Matters arising from the minutes** <u>Core Paths</u>. The secretary had written to Matt Dent of Highland Council suggesting use of Paths for All funding for proposed upgrading of the Ardgay Hill/Oakwood path. <u>Christmas Lights</u>. There was discussion as to who would take responsibility for putting up the lights in Ardgay this year. Opinions differed as to whether this work should be done by a volunteer, given the need for safety. It was agreed to consult the local Fire Service for advice and possible assistance *Chair to contact Fire Officer*
- **5. Secretary's Report** Invitations had been received to attend:- <u>Scottish Water</u> Public Board meeting in Inverness on 16 Nov, to include an update on the company's operations and capital expenditure plans. It was understood that Pete Campbell, Chair of Creich CC would be attending, and that he agreed to provide feedback on the meeting. <u>Secretary to send apologies and request feedback</u>. <u>Association of Scottish Community Councils AGM on Sat 20 Nov in Glasgow</u>. <u>Members unable to attend apologies had been sent</u>
- <u>Crown Estate open day/exhibition on Wind, Wave and Tidal Power in Thurso on 9/10 November.</u> No members able to attend apologies to be sent <u>Kyle of Sutherland Heritage Society</u> A copy of a report produced on the Lest We Forget project had been received and was warmly recommended by the Chair. <u>Gearrchoille Community Wood Ardgay</u>, A letter had been received raising the issue of future funding for the maintenance of the site and legal costs. It was agreed that this matter would be deferred until the next meeting.
- **6. Treasurer's Report** <u>Treasurer's Account</u> The current cleared balance stands at £1546.74, with no outstanding liabilities. <u>Projects Account</u> The current cleared balance stands at £4162 with outstanding liabilities of £126.90. An expected bill of £310 for the last newsletter has yet to be received. <u>Toilets Account</u> The current cleared balance stands at £829.43 with outstanding liabilities of £180. One further payment of £180 is due next week, after which the remainder will be transferred to the Projects Account for the winter.
- 7. Proposal to appoint a Vice-Chairman for the Community Council proposal was deferred until AGM in April 2011
- **8. Grant applications to Beinn Tharsuinn Windfarm Community Ltd -** *Ladybird Club, Ardgay* £200 towards purchase of art and craft materials **approved**. *Highland Small Communities Housing Trust* £615.63 for local housing project feasibility and survey work **approved**.
- 9. Street Light Savings An email had been received from Creich CC seeking our views on the possibility of making savings on street lighting between Ardgay and Bonar by either turning the lights off after midnight, or reducing the number of lamps lit by 50%. The Chair invited discussion of this and other opportunities to make savings on unnecessary street lighting. Cllr Rowantree pointed out that since street lighting requirements were generally prescribed in appendices to statutory legislation, there would be difficulties in making local exceptions. There were also specific requirements for lighting where there was a pavement or within 30 mph limits. The Chair noted that lights were kept on at Ardgay Public Toilets even during periods when it was closed. Marion Turner asked whether it might be possible for some of the street lighting to be manually operated with a time-switch as needed by pedestrians. It was agreed to liaise with Creich CC and to contact Robert Gunn at Technical Services to investigate this and any other options for savings on lighting costs.
- **10. Voluntary Groups East Sutherland** The AGM was due to be held on Friday 19 Nov. The Chair was unanimously proposed for election as a director, and will attend with Phil Olson.
- **11. Windfarms update** <u>Achany</u> The last meeting of the funding applications panel had been inquorate, with the result that applications had to be remitted to the next meeting. It appears that there are ongoing difficulties in finding community representatives. <u>Rosehall</u> Doreen Gibbs had attended a meeting of the Community Liaison Group on 26 October. E.ON had reported on site preparation, including forestry harvesting and plans to upgrade the road for site traffic. The contractors are committed to using local suppliers. E.ON intend to collaborate with Inverness College to train local people to work on the installation once it is operational. *Beinn Tharsuinn* No update.
- **12. Development Post Update** A job description/contract details were being prepared for the Development Officer post by a Kyle of Sutherland Initiative steering group comprised of Ardgay and Creich CC members.
- 13. Forestry Roads Doreen Gibbs had attended a meeting hosted by Cllr George Farlow to discuss ongoing concerns about the safety and structural impact of timber/windfarm transport using the local road network. Although the Forestry Commission had issued guidance to transport contractors, anecdotal evidence suggested that individual drivers were still contravening regulations in terms of safe speeds and space between vehicles. The transport for windfarms was better regulated, with operators obliged to survey and if necessary upgrade any roads used for site access.

Cllr Rowantree pointed out that no action would be taken unless anyone witnessing a contravention was able to provide details such as registration number, time, description of driver, etc.

He also noted that seven lorries had in fact already been stopped on the Struie road since the introduction of a new weight restriction in mid-September. It was agreed to raise the issue with VOSA (Vehicle and Operator Service Agency) who have the responsibility to regulate commercial vehicle and driving safety. It was also noted that the matter would be on the agenda for the next Ward Forum.

**14. Any other competent business - Struie roadworks** - Several members commented on the driving hazard presented by a steep sided ramp at road works on the Struie Road. It was suggested that the ramp needed to be much better signed and lit to avoid taking drivers by surprise. Secretary to contact, HC. **Dog fouling** - Willie MacLaren asked whether a dog waste bin could be provided on the Ardgay-Bonar Bridge road. Willie to contact John Clark

**Remembrance Day** - A wreath has been ordered for the service. The public toilets would be open on the day. Refreshments would be available following the service in Bonar Bridge Hall. **Ward Forum** the next one will be in Melvich on the 27 November.

**New Community Council Noticeboard** - The Chair expressed our appreciation for Derek Matheson's help in erecting the new community notice board. **Newsletter** - He also wished to remind everyone that the deadline for submissions to the next newsletter was 11 Nov 2010

The meeting ended at 8.55pm Next meeting will be on Wed 1 Dec at 7pm in Ardgay Hall.

For the newsletter, regarding recycling: there are very few Highland Council recycling centres which will accept the 'Tetrapak' type containers, but it should be noted that our nearest site is the Dingwall recycling centre. This is fine if one is occasionally travelling to Dingwall. It can be awkward as the location of the site is inadequately signed, off the Strathpeffer road. The site is governed by set opening hours which include a shut hour for lunch. All in all it is a worthwhile facility, but one has to understand where it is and when it is open.

ACHANY APPRENTICESHIP SCHEME PILOT TAKES OFF - 1 November 2010 - Two local young people began apprenticeships, thanks to funding from SSE's Achany Wind Farm. Andrew Bradford from Tain and Callum Smart from Bonar Bridge recently started work with local businesses, Ardgay Garage and W.M. Plumbing Ltd respectively.

In February, SSE's Achany Community Fund was launched to benefit the community council areas of Ardgay & District, Creich and Lairg. The fund was established by SSE and will run for the lifetime of the Achany Wind Farm, expected to be 25 years. The main purpose of the fund – which has an annual value of £76,000 – is to stimulate economic regeneration in the Kyle of Sutherland, including creating employment for young people. The Achany Advisory Panel is a group of local people responsible for allocating awards from the fund. It set up a sub-group to consider ways in which the fund could support local business development. They identified the need to support sustainable local employment opportunities for young people. Claire Bruce, from the Panel, said: "We decided to run a pilot scheme to encourage local businesses to take on apprentices, with the fund offsetting the cost of employing the apprentices while they learn their trade. "We want to help stem the tide of young people leaving the area because they can't find work. If we can create genuine long-term employment opportunities for them locally, it'll help strengthen the area and encourage local economic growth." Andrew Bradford is undertaking a Vehicle Technician Apprentice. He said: "I hope my apprenticeship will lead onto a career that I enjoy. It will give me the chance to learn a trade and hopefully gain a recognised qualification. I'm really enjoying my apprenticeship and consider myself very lucky to be a part of this scheme." Peter Donaldson, Head of Renewables Operations for SSE, said: "The Achany Wind Farm will generate around £2million of long-term funding for the community. I'm delighted to see the fund being used in such an innovative way that will help sustain the local economy. I wish Andrew and Callum every success in their chosen careers."

Along with the pilot, more research will be carried on the feasibility of funding apprenticeships in this way.

friend who had experienced and confirmed it. It is useful....even driving at night. One method used by Canadian Military Drivers for years. Most motorists would turn on HIGH or FASTEST SPEED of the wipers during heavy downpour, yet the visibility in front of the windshield is still bad. In the event you face such a situation, just try your SUN GLASSES (any model will do), and miracle! All of a sudden, your visibility in front of your windshield is perfectly clear, as if there is no rain. Make sure you always have a pair of SUN GLASSES in your car, as you are not only helping yourself to drive safely with good vision, but also might save your friend's life by giving them this idea. Amazing, you still see the drops on the windshield, but not the sheet of rain falling. You can see where the rain bounces off the road. It works to eliminate the "blindness" from passing vehicles spraying you too. They ought to teach that little tip in driver's training. It really does work. And for a similar reason, why "Fog" lights must make WHITE light, or else are useless in FOG. Those YELLOW "FOG" lights are great in those blinding night SNOWstorms, and those big snowflakes become virtually invisible. But YELLOW is useless in RAIN & FOG. This next warning is another good one! I wonder how many people know about this: A 36 year old female had an accident several weeks ago and totaled her car. It was raining, though not excessively, when her car suddenly began to hydro-plane and literally flew through the air.. She was not seriously injured but very stunned at the sudden occurrence! When she explained to the Police Officer what had happened he told her something that every driver should know - NEVER DRIVE IN THE RAIN WITH YOUR CRUISE CONTROL ON .She thought she was being cautious by setting the cruise control and maintaining a safe consistent speed in the rain. But the Officer told her that if the cruise control is on when your car begins to hydroplane and your tyres lose contact with the road surface, your car will accelerate to a higher rate of speed making you take off like an airplane. She told the Police Officer that was exactly what had occurred. The Officer said this warning should be listed on the sun-visor - NEVER USE CRUISE CONTROL WHEN THE ROAD SURFACE IS WET OR ICY, along with the airbag warning. We tell our teenagers to set the cruise control and drive a safe speed - but we don't tell them to use the cruise control only when the tarmac is dry. NOTE: Some vehicles (like the Toyota Sienna Limited XLE) will not allow you to set the cruise control when the windshield wipers are on. If you tell this to 15 people and only one of them doesn't know about it, then it was all worth it.. You might have saved a life. Winter Driving Reminders (you already know these) - Check your tyre treads and change to snow/ice tyres now. Top up your screen-wash with antifreeze type and carry a spare bottle of mixture in the car in case you need to top up during your journey. Keep a couple of blankets in the car along with a drink and some nibbles in case you get caught in a snow drift or long traffic jam because of one. Make sure you always have enough fuel to keep your engine running for the same reason. Carry a spade or shovel in case you need to 'dig out' of snow. Leave lots of room if you are following someone else on an icy road. Be Careful.

**Driving in the rain - this may save your life - GOOD VISION IN A DOWNPOUR** - How to achieve good vision while driving during a heavy downpour. We are not sure why it is so effective; just try this method when it rains heavily. This method was given me by a Police

CYCLE for WELLBEING - The Stone Man Circuit (14.5Km) - This mountain bike route is a long gradual ascent with a few steep slopes and good views from the top followed by an exciting descent and a gentle return along the road to Ardgay. It requires good level of fitness and a strong nerve for the final descent. Takes about 2 hours. Leave from the War Memorial and head up Ardgay Hill, fork left on to the Oldtown Road. Cross the cattle grid and when the tarmac runs out go straight ahead passing behind Struie Cottage. Continue to the end of this track, cross the field and head towards the house at Badvoon. Pass below the house and head up behind the steading

to pick up a path which takes you through a forestry gate. Follow a well defined path uphill with bracken on one side and heather on the other. There is a wet crossing point before you reach a good forestry road. Along this section look out for the "Stone Man" up on the right. Before the forestry these old stone remains resembling a man – especially in the mist were an important landmark in an otherwise bare moor. Continue to a T junction with a bridge and gate on your right. Cross the bridge and head uphill through the gate onto Gledfield Estate land. The big gate is kept locked but the small gate should be open. Continue through the forestry uphill on this track till you come out of the forest. Here you have wonderful view of Strathcarron, the Alladale glens, Ben Klibreck and Migdale Rock. It is almost all downhill from here so this is a good point to take a break. What comes next is a very steep downhill section with some loose surface. \* Always cycle within your capabilities. Walk downhill if necessary and enjoy the views!\* At the bottom you will reach the tarmac road at a gate opposite Gledfield Farm. Turn right and it is a short ride back to the village. "During the shooting season as a courtesy & for your safety please ring Gledfield Estate before using this route (01863 766795)".

CONGRATULATIONS - The CRANNAG Bistro, at Bonar Bridge in Sutherland, has been crowned the Press and Journal Taste of Highlands and Islands Restaurant of the Year. The small, family-run restaurant was opened three years ago by husband and wife team lan and Kathy Smith. The venture was a natural progression for the couple, who previously spent almost 14 years running a foodmanufacturing company producing high-quality ready meals using local produce. With Bonar Bridge having a population of less than 1.000, they use innovative ideas – such as holding regular quest chef nights and themed evenings designed to promote local suppliers and showcase Highland fare – to keep diners coming back. As a result, the restaurant has put the village on the culinary map, with guests travelling from far and wide to dine there. Although faced with a difficult decision, the judges, who visited the restaurant anonymously, felt the Smiths' passion for local food – which runs throughout the entire menu — and local alcoholic and soft drinks, made the bistro the clear winner. The judges said: "The food was truly seasonal, innovative without being overly clever, fresh and overall tasted superb. "Real cooking skill was demonstrated to turn non-prime cuts of local meat into excellent dishes, which is much more challenging than starting with the best meat, and puts the cost of good dining within reach of all. "The quality of the food was superb, while the service was unaffectedly Highland: relaxed, informal but as attentive as necessary." The Press and Journal has sponsored the award for the last three years. Editor Derek Tucker said: "The aim of the award is to encourage restaurants to inform customers of their local suppliers and help spread the message about the excellent food and drink produced in the Highlands and islands. "Once again, an impressive list of finalists demonstrated this. My congratulations go to the Crannag Bistro for succeeding in what was very stiff competition."

**KYLE OF SUTHERLAND YOUTH DEVELOPMENT GROUP (KSYDG) -** The KSYDG is continuing to expand its project based on the south Bonar industrial and are pleased to announce the granting of permission to use the two portocabin classes donated by Farquhar Ltd. The project runs three sessions P1-P4 Tues 3.30 – 4.30, P5-P7 Thurs 3.45 – 4.45, S1 & over Thurs 7.30 – 9.30 The porta-cabins have provided essential additional space to accommodate the increasing number of users and have allowed us to include extra activities. In one room we have a pool table, table tennis, seating & playstation area and an art space. The second room is kept largely as a free space where games can be enjoyed, jamming sessions and a practice space for specific projects.

With funds secured from the Scottish community Foundation (Achany Windfarm) work is under way to further consolidate the building upgrading it to meet the needs of the project.

Events taking place; Accoustic Guitar lessons funded by MFR & COOP. Course runs from 9<sup>th</sup> Nov to 21<sup>st</sup> Dec on Tuesdays. 7.15 beginners 8.00 intermediate/advance. The group has four guitars which are for loan to those who wish to try but do not have their own guitar. This course is free of charge.

<u>Tin Whistle</u> this is for P1 – P4 and runs on a Tues during the normal club times. Children are given their own tin whistle and are being tutored by Ameilia in groups. We have whistles for 32 children.

Pantomime Will be showing 21st January location to be confirmed performed by the youth group and the p5 to P7 choir.

Art The after school club has an active art programme which runs each term projects include clay, bag making, flying insects! To name a few.

Migdale Hospital – Update from Robertson Highland (October 2010) – Progress The construction on both floors is now complete including all timber wall panels which now allows the roof to be constructed. We are now approaching the 50% mark on the roof and internal works are progressing. Following some late nights during the month we have now completed all the concrete works within the building which completes our requirement for working during the night. In addition to this we have completed the retaining wall through the site that now encapsulates the building within the hillside. Community Tours – Now that the building has developed for all to see we would invite you to the site to view the building as it progresses. Firewood – As part of our commitment to the environment we aim to divert as much of our waste as possible from landfill and we are offering our waste timber, on a first come first served basis – please telephone or e-mail for details. Next Weeks – We will continue construction of the timber roof and progress to tiling the Main area that faces the village. As the roof progresses above the internals of the building will develop and internal partitions and service installation will begin. The lift shaft will also begin to take shape for the lift to be installed in the new year.
